Wanted for Cattle Rustling in the Beaverton Section

HAS GONE TO PARTS UNKNOWN

Bore Good Reputation Until a Year or so Ago, When he Got in Trouble

Warrant of arrest has been issued against Gottlieb Zuercher, a well known young man of the Beaverton section, and who farmed for some years in that vicinity, being on the Bellwood place for some time. Young Zuercher always bore a good reputation until a year or so ago, when he took about \$200 from a cousin, who resides in West Portland. The cousin was satisfied that Gottlieb got his money and had him arrested, after Zuercher had returned from a trip to the Salem state fair.



Gottlieb expressed surprise at his arrest and admitted that he had the money, but proclaimed that he merely took it as a joke to make his relative more careful with his funds. The case was not prosecuted, and later Gottlieb came back to Beaverton. For the last several weeks cows have been missing in that section and suspicion pointed to Zuercher. John Welch lost a heifer and the head was found at a slaughter house, where Zuercher did his killing. When confronted with the evidence, Gottlieb admitted the killing, but denied bringing the animal to the pen. However, he refused to tell who did, and when the chase became too close, skipped the country. Officers have sought him in vain but he is not to be found at his usual haunts. His parents reside in the vicinity of Cedar Mill, and are highly respected citizens.
