SPRAY FOR THE COOLING MOTH

Time Soon Here to Get the Rascal That Makes Wormy Fruit

GET YOUR SPRAY READY AT ONCE

A Few Trite Reminders For Fruit Growers in County

Washington County has great fruit possibilities in the apple line, if a very little care be taken at the opportune time. Some time since the Argus had a very comprehensive article on spraying for the cooling moth, and it gave the proper time for spraying for best results. Upon request B. Leis, of Beaverton, sends the Argus the following on the essential time to go after this pest. Here it is:

Some time ago I wrote on spraying for the cooling moth so that growers would be ready when the time came. Well, the time is now at hand when the cooling moth will deposit their eggs and (lest we forget) the time for spraying for the first brood is now here. From the 20th of June to about the 1st of July will be the proper time to spray for this parasite, by using three pounds of arsenate of lead to 50 gallons of water, adding to the mixture one gallon of lime and sulphur to 50 gallons of water, or 1/4 gallon to 50 gallons, which is also effective for the Baldwin rot, or brown rot in the apple. Now I wish to call the attention of growers to the fact of getting the proper brand of arsenate of lead, which should be neutral, as all brands of arsenate do not mix well with lime and sulphur, and you are liable to scorch the foliage. I will quote Prof. Cordley in Bulletin No. 108 of the O. A. C.: "It appears that the acid arsenates have some tendency to injure foliage, and cannot so well be used with the lime and sulphur solutions as can the neutral arsenates. This includes, according to the same authority, Swift's, Hemingways and the Lyon brands. They are acid arsenates."

Personally I am using the Grasselli arsenate, which is a neutral arsenate of lead, and which mixes readily with the lime and the sulphur. As I may be intruding upon your space, I will close for this time. If any reader desires further information I will gladly give it if they will call me up by the independent phone, Beaverton.
