Minor John F. Hill Asks \$10,000 From Pacific University

LOST A FINGER BY GUN'S DISCHARGE

Bagley & Sims Prosecuting and E. B. Tongue Defending

Judge Campbell opened circuit court Monday morning, and the big damage case of John F. Hill, minor, versus Pacific University, is now on trial, beginning yesterday morning.

Harvey, Sims and Geo. R. Bagley are attorneys for the boy, and E. B. Tongue, and Attorney Huntington and Smith, of Portland, are handling the defense.
