FORGER LANSING GETS FIVE YEARS

Charley Burnham, Petty Thief, Gets Three Years

JUDGE CAMPBELL SENDS TO HOME

Lansing Forged the Name of Wm. Chalmers to Check

The grand jury yesterday morning returned indictments against James H. Lansing and Charles Burnham Jr., the first for forging the name of Wm. Chalmers to a check, which he attempted to pass at the Forest Grove National Bank.

Lansing pleaded guilty as the check was found in his possession when he was arrested in Portland. He waived time for sentence and Judge Campbell gave him five years at the state penitentiary.

Young Burnham also pleaded guilty and the court made him a present of 3 years. Burnham has been in the county jail several times, the result of numerous petty thefts.
