SIXTY EIGHT THOUSAND IS PAID TO TEACHERS

Superintendent M. C. Case Sends in His Annual Statement

STATISTICS OF COUNTY SCHOOLS

Less Than Fifty Per Cent. of Expenditure Goes to Teachers

The annual school report for Washington County due at the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction next Monday, was prepared and mailed to Supt. Ackerman on the 20th inst. The report comprises a general statement of all records pertaining to the schools of the county.

Among the items reported were the following: School population as shown by last school census—3635 males; 3285 females; total, 7020 school children. Average number of days school taught 183. Whole number days attendance during year 821169. Whole number days absence 49946. Average daily attendance 4760. Per cent of attendance 94.

Whole number of organized districts in county 100. Number of school rooms in operation during the past school year 133. Number schools visited by the school superintendent, 95. Average length of time devoted to each visit 2 hours. Number of miles traveled in performance of official duties during the school year, about 2500 miles.
