## ORVAL TENNIS DROWNED SUNDAY

Was Formerly a Resident of  
Shady Brook, Beyond Glencoe

FATHER DIED ON TRAIN YEARS BACK

Was a Native of Washington County,  
and Aged 23 Years

Orval Tennis, aged 23 years, and a native of Washington County, was drowned in Portland, Sunday afternoon, near one of the many mills that skirt the water front. Young Tennis' companion had swam to the bank, leaving the young fellow alone in the water. He finally looked to see if Tennis was coming ashore, but was unable to locate him. Tennis had been seized with a cramp and had disappeared.

The body was recovered after a short time, and was taken to Forest Grove for interment.

The Tennis family a few years ago lived at Shady Brook, and later moved to the Grove. Shortly after leaving the Glencoe section, W. W. Tennis, father of the dead boy, was taken suddenly ill on a Southern Pacific train, and died before medical aid could be summoned. The mother died last year. He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Ross Munkers and Miss Cressie Tennis, both of Forest Grove.
