ROSELAIR GETS SENTENCE MONDAY

Mandate Arrives From Supreme Court This Morning

WIFE SLAYER WILL SOON HANG

Judge Campbell Will Come up From Seaside to Set Day

Just before the Argus goes to press it is announced that the mandate in the Roselair case reached County Clerk Bailey, and he has telegraphed Judge J. U. Campbell, at Seaside. The Court will reach Hillsboro Monday morning and Roselair will be sentenced Monday afternoon.

Sheriff Hancock will arrive here with the prisoner, over whom the courts have been working since last December, early Monday forenoon. It is said that the execution will not be later than 30 days after date of sentence. Sheriff Hancock says that one of the guards told him that when Roselair was told of the Supreme Court's decision that the murderer had one of his "spells."

The prisoner will be taken back to Salem Monday night, on a late car, and he will be placed under a death watch until the day of hanging.

The viewers have their own time to meet with the surveyor, no date being set.

The road petition of John Oppenlander was referred to the district attorney.

Judge Goodin tells the Argus that shipment of rock is to begin next Monday for the Hillsboro permanent road work. Loads will be ready Monday evening and by Tuesday several carloads will reach this end of the line.
