

## SAMUEL MARKEE DIES AT FOREST GROVE

One of the Oldest Pioneers in Years in County  
Came to Coast in Sixty-four  
Was Six Months Crossing The Plains to the Oregon Country

Samuel Markee, who was born in Coshocton County, Ohio, August 14, 1817, died at the home of his son, George Markee, at Forest Grove, Wednesday, August 3, 1910. Mr. Markee suffered a severe hip injury two or three years ago and it has troubled him more or less ever since, and added to his infirmities. He was married to Waltha A. Lull, in Ohio, and for a few years they resided in Illinois. In 1864 they crossed the plains to Oregon.



Settling first near Cedar Mill, they later moved to the Forest Grove section. It took six months to make the trip from Illinois to Oregon. Mrs. Markee died about 15 years ago. Mr. Markee was well known all over Washington county, and was noted for his integrity. He leaves the following children to mourn his loss:

The funeral took place last Saturday and interment was in the Naylor cemetery, Forest Grove.

### CROSSED PLAINS WITH SCOTT

Kenyon Crandall, of this city, was one of those who crossed the Plains from St. Joe, Missouri, into the Salt Lake country, in 1852, with the Scott wagon train. He knew H. W. Scott well, and his father. Mr. Crandall says he met the veteran editor many times afterward, and that as a young man Mr. Scott worked on the roads near Forest Grove when Crandall was road supervisor, in the sixties. He remembers Scott as a lad of 14 years and states that Harvey drove an ox team in the train. When Crandall lived in Portland in the eighties he met Mr. Scott nearly every day and they frequently talked over the trip from Illinois to the coast.

## FIRST CRUSHED ROCK REACHES THIS CITY

Arrived Yesterday Morning and Unloaded on Baseline

### WILL GET SHIPMENT EVERY DAY

Start on Stretch From P. R. & N. to Dairy Creek Bridge

Yesterday marked a new era in the history of Hillsboro in the way of road building. A carload of crushed rock arrived from the county quarry at Oswego, and was unloaded on the P. R. & N. railway track at the Baseline road crossing. Bunkers had been built and a platform on each side of the track held the shipment. Carpenters and workmen were busy getting the elevator ready and a team was engaged in hauling water to get the highway in condition before hauling the crushed material.

J. N. Grabel will measure for the haulers and Wolf Brothers will get the stone away as fast as it is hauled in from the quarry. It is expected that several carloads daily will arrive from now on. As soon as the surface of the road is laid it will be rolled with a heavy steel roller to make a good hard roadbed.
