Three sizes of crushed rock are used in construction. The first layer runs all the way from the size of your fist to half its size; the next layer is about the size of a hen's egg, and the last coating is crushed very fine, Each layer is thoroughly rolled before the next is placed and the last coat is wet thoroughly and then rolled for further orders. If the rock quarry would furnish the crushed rock a week's time would see the stretch clear to days, but two carloads arrive. The county court is, however, moving heaven and earth to get five or six cars daily and it looks as though this amount will prevail when things get to running smooth.
