**ISAAC N. HARRELL  
PAYS HIS PENALTY**

Hanged at Salem, Friday, for Murder of Two Brothers

**DROP BURSTED JUGULAR VEIN**

Was Penitent for His Crime and Embraced Catholic Faith

Isaac N. Harrell, who murdered two young men, the Newell Brothers, in Klamath County, last June, paid the penalty last Friday at 12:30, at Salem. He was given a drop of five feet and 8 inches, or two inches less than Roselair, who was executed the day prior. Harrell's jugular was burst and the execution was the bloodiest in the annals of the state. Harrell was penitent for his crime, but made no expressions except to Father Francis, of Grants Pass, to whom he expressed deep sorrow, and whose faith he embraced.

Harrell was born on Gales Creek, forty eight years ago. He and his parents lived in Hillsboro in the early eighties, residing on Fir, between Second and Third, across the street from the Ledford home.

He and his father, Wm. Harrell, did some land clearing for Henry Wehrung.

**GEO. W. HAYDON**

George W. Haydon, aged 82 years, died at his home near Thatcher, September 7, 1910. Deceased was a veteran of the Rebellion, serving on the Union side, and was also an Indian war veteran. He was a native of Boone County, Missouri, and crossed the plains in 1852. After serving in the Indian wars, when the Civil war commenced he enlisted. In all he served seven years in both troubles. He has lived in the Thatcher section for about 26 years. His widow, a son, Allen, and an adopted daughter, Miss Inatha Haydon, survive. His nephew, James A. Haydon, has charge of the Portland city barns, on the East side. The funeral took place last Friday and interment was in the Union cemetery.

**CARL WEISSENBORN**

Carl Weissenborn died Thursday, September 8, 1910, at Glencoe. Deceased was born in Pommern, Germany, in March, 1841, and immigrated to the United States in 1870. He came to Oregon about 16 years ago, and first settled in Clackamas County. Eleven months ago he settled in Glencoe. His wife and three children survive: Mrs. Charles Walters, Glencoe; Mrs. Carrie Deurr, Holyrood, Kansas; and Mrs. Anna Polifka, of Portland. The funeral took place Sunday at the Tuatatin Plains Presbyterian church, Rev. Frierichs, of Hillsboro, officiating.
