

# SAID TRAGEDY AT TOWN OF CORNELIUS

## Little Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George White Killed Tuesday

### FELL FROM A MOVING WAGON

Wheeled Street Child on Head and Skull Was Crushed

Little Beattie White, the 6 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George White, of Cornelius, died Tuesday evening about nine o'clock, after suffering several hours from an accident in which her head was crushed by a wagon wheel. Mr. White was driving down the street in Cornelius, at a trot, and when he rounded the corner in front of the Cornelius State Bank the child lost her balance and fell backward. She was caught by one of the hindmost wheels, cutting a terrible wound in the head. She was picked up and carried to the Everett drug store and attended by Dr. Everest, but it was seen from the first that the wound was fatal.

The parents are grief stricken over the sad accident.
