After seven days of a conference session the Methodist Ministry of the State of Oregon adjourned Monday evening, and Salem will be the next meeting place. Rev. F. V. Fisher, who has had the Hillsboro charge, goes to Utah as a missionary, while Rev. R. C. Blackwell, of Oregon City, will have the Hillsboro assignment. The last day of the session was the one of real interest to the ministers, for it was not until then that preachers would know their next year's field. Bishop Smith and his superintendents, after many cabinet meetings, made up the appointment sheet, and so far as Washington County is affected the charges will be held as follows:
