

A CHANCE FOR GOOD ROADS, AND AT ONCE

Proposed That Counties can Bond and Build Decent Highways

BALLOT NO. 354 SHOWS THE WAY

Constitution Now Permits of but Debt of Five Thousand

The voters of Oregon who are in favor of permanent roads will have a chance to vote for an amendment to the constitution which will permit counties to build macadam or other permanent highways without being hampered by the constitutional provision that holds us down to a \$5,000 debt. Ballot No. 354 calls for an amendment to the state organic law, and allows counties to pledge their credit for permanent road building.

Dr. F. J. Bailey, who owned the Union Woolen Mills, has bought a power site at Washington, superintending the building and installation of the plant. This move will give him water transportation for a big wool territory, and he will have a valuable plant when it is ready for manufacturing.

ABOUT \$30,000 FOR COUNTY SCHOOLS

Superintendent Case Makes October Apportionment

SEVERAL DISTRICTS FORFEIT FUNDS

CONDENSED MILK RAISES IN MARKET

Factories Cannot Possibly Fill all Orders Coming in

DECREASE IN SUPPLY ONE CAUSE

Price Will Probably Not Raise so far as Retail is Concerned

Coast prices on condensed milk to the retailers, by the case, have raised from 10 to 15 cents per case within the past week, owing to the heavy demand for the product and the milk shortage which has ensued owing to the long dry spell. Carnation has raised 10 cents per case, and other coast brands have also been stuck up in price. There is no likelihood, however, of the retail price raising beyond the 10 cents per can.

The two condensers in this county have had trouble in getting a supply sufficient for operating at the best advantage, and it is understood that they are away behind on their orders. The price of fresh milk has caused many in the large coast cities, as well as in the smaller towns, to revert to the use of the canned product, and this has increased the order books mightily.
