Slip Cog and Name Candidate for School Superintendent

HILLSBORO MAN FOR RECORDER

Forest Grove Gets Clerkship Nomination. Two Representatives

The prohibitionists met in Hillsboro at the court house, last Friday, and nominated a ticket to be voted upon at the ensuing election. Two representatives, a clerk, recorder, treasurer, county commissioner, and a candidate for superintendent of schools were nominated—although the latter was superfluous, as Mr. Case's term does not expire until two years later, 1912 when the general election shall elect a successor.

John Boyd, of Cornelius, was chairman of the meeting and J. F. Kerr, of Hillsboro, was secretary. The candidates named were:

Steel is being laid this week on the logging railway. The mill has been idle since last Spring owing to litigation over a right of way, without which it was impossible to get timber hauled out to the main line. Foreman Charles Brown says he welcomes the starting-up of the plant, for he is never satisfied unless he hears the saws cutting into the timber.
