**COUNTY RETURNS BIG
VOTE AGAINST PROHI**

Beaten in Washington County by Majority of 820

HOME RULE BILL ALSO WINS

Search Law Also Badly Snowed Under by Ballots

Statewide prohibition was badly beaten in Washington County, last Tuesday, as well as in the state, Oregon returning a majority against the measure reaching the neighborhood of 16,000. This county went on record as opposed to prohibition by a majority of 820, and the home rule measure, giving incorporated towns the right to decide their own liquor policy, called by a majority of 112.

The prohibition managers put up a big fight, and if literature and speaking went for anything they did all possible to swing the county to the water wagon column.

Both Hillsboros went against the dry campaign, and where the German and Swiss vote was heavy the wets received a big vote.

The majority against a dry Oregon here was rather larger than was expected. Four years ago the wets carried by 1,000. Two years ago in June, a little over 400 majority wet was cast. This time the vote against sumptuary legislation increased, although it did not get back to the old high water mark.
