MAYOR BAILEY NOT A CANDIDATE

Says That His Private Business Will not Permit

Mayor A. R. Bailey will not run for mayor at the coming election, although he could have had the nomination hands down if public expression goes for anything.

City election comes the first Monday in December, and the charter revision will have a vote.

Dr. A. B. Bailey leaves the mayor's chair with a record that is to his credit. He and his associates now have the charter amendments where public improvements can obtain if an affirmative vote shall be recorded.

NEW CITY CHARTER SHOULD PASS BIG

Many Important Matters are Provided for in Proposed Measure

HARD SURFACE STREETS IS ONE

Property Owners can Have ten Years to Pay Street Improvements

The new city charter should pass without much opposition at the coming city election. For street improvements, the new instrument makes proper provision, and the terms of the city are not severe, in case anyone shall wish to be granted time, ten annual payments will be afforded, with an interest charge.

The provision affecting street improvements, so far as the power to order and execute is concerned, is as follows: "The council is authorized and empowered, whenever it deems expedient, to provide by resolution for the improvement of any street or alley in said City of Hillsboro, by planking, replanking, paving, repaving, graveling, regravelling, macadamizing, such street or alley, or laying any other kind of paving or surfacing thereon, or repairing any kind of paving previously done, or constructing a sewer therein, any such improvement to include cost of curbing along such street or alley, and all the expense of making any and all such improvements herein authorized and enumerated shall be paid by the owner, or owners, of lots, tracts, or parcels of land specially benefited by such improvements, and the council is authorized and empowered to determine the character and kind of any such improvement, to determine what lands are specially benefited by such improvements, and the amount to which each parcel, lot or tract of land is benefited, and to levy and assess upon each lot, tract or parcel of land the proportion or amount of such expense, and make the same a lien thereon, as the said lot, tract or parcel is found to be benefited thereby, and to collect such assessments."
