## ALBERT L. WEST WAS CONVICTED

Jury Out but a few Minutes and Returned Verdict of Guilty

**CHARGED WITH A CRIMINAL ASSAULT**

Prosecuting Witness was Mrs. Inez Haines, of Sherwood

Tuesday and Wednesday were taken up in circuit court by the case of the State of Oregon vs. Albert L. West, of Sherwood, and who is a rural mail carrier out of that postoffice. West was charged with criminal assault, the prosecuting witness being Mrs. Inez Haines, wife of Chas. Haines, and the crime is alleged to have been committed in June, 1910. West's wife and little child were in attendance during the trial and the husband of Mrs. Haines was also in court. Attorney Bump defended the case, and his deputy, T. H. Tongue, handled the case for the state, and their pleas to the jury, asking for West's conviction, were the most impassioned heard here since the Roselair trial. The defendant was given until Dec. 27 to apply for a new trial. The jury: John Ireland, E. H. Northrup, Gerhardt Goetze, Aug. Tews, Frank Dooley, Andrew Pierson, Jas A. Sewell, Cassius Schofield, Emil Kurath, H. D. McEntire, C. A. Jones and John Witt.
