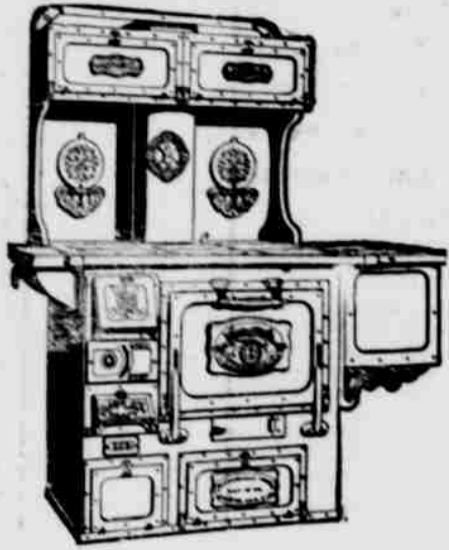

SISTER-IN-LAW OF HILLSBORO RESIDENT

Died in Seattle, Recently, and Death Recalls Famous Incident

WAS ON BOARD THE CONTINENTAL

Three Hundred Women Sailed Around Cape Horn for Seattle

Sherburne Wilson, now living below Beaverton, writes the ARGUS, enclosing a clipping from a newspaper detailing the death of his sister-in-law, Mrs. Zeborah Wilson, aged 83 years, at Seattle. The passing of Mrs. Wilson recalls the incident of the vessel Continental, which left New York in 1866, with a cargo of 300 women, for Seattle. A. S. Mercer, then president of the Washington Territorial University, conceived the idea of having New England school ma'ams shipped to Seattle to become wives of the early settlers. Gov. Andrews, of Massachusetts, and Edward Everett Hale endorsed the idea, and the Continental was chartered and sailed around the horn with its cargo of femininity. Many were stranded when they reached the coast, and many failed to get husbands. Some of the marriages, however, were fruitful of happiness, and some families, thus strangely united, have raised children that have become prominent in the politics and social fabric of the state.

Mrs. Wilson was survived by her husband, John Wilson, who is now aged 90 years—11 years older than his brother Sherburne, of Hillsboro—and one son, John H. Wilson. Mrs. Wilson was married to her surviving husband in 1852, and accompanied the voyageurs in quest of health, as she had hemorrhages of the lungs. She grew in strength after reaching the fir-clad slopes of the Sound. The despatch touching upon her death follows:

"Seattle, Wn., Dec. 18.—Mrs. Zeborah Wilson, 83 years old, one of the 300 women who came around Cape Horn as the famous 'cargo of wives' for Seattle settlers in 1866, died at her home here yesterday. The 'cargo of wives' was organized by A. S. Mercer, then president of the Washington Territorial University. He advocated the importation of New England school teachers to Puget Sound to make wives for the settlers here. His scheme was endorsed by Gov. Andrews, of Massachusetts, Edward Everett Hale and others, and resulted in the chartering of the ship Continental, in which the voyage was made. Shortly before sailing from New York, Mrs. Wilson was married to John Wilson, and the couple made the voyage around the Horn, and through Magellan, together."
