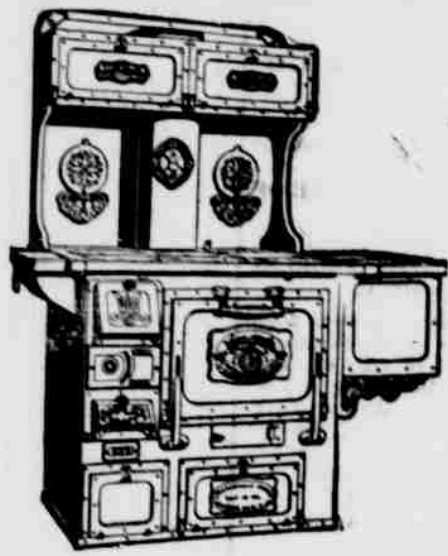

DR. S. M. WENDT ASKS FOR BILL—WIFE RESISTED

Prominent Forest Grove Physician
and Surgeon in Circuit Court

DIVORCED ONCE AND RE-MARRIED

Husband Alleged Wife was Intensely
Jealous and Hurt Practice

Dr. S. M. Wendt, of Forest Grove, was before the circuit court Tuesday, asking for a bill of divorce from Otilie Wendt. In turn Mrs. Wendt asked for a decree. Dr. Wendt says in his complaint that some months ago his wife put his trunk on the front porch in view of the neighbors, and then locked the door on him; and that when he went home he was forced to enter the house by use of a latch key, while she watched him from a neighboring residence. He says that she was intensely jealous and injured his practice by charges that he cared for other women. In turn she says that her husband frequently told her to get a divorce—this she says he wanted her to do so he could affiliate with his soul mates and affinites. The wife, in her cross-bill, asked for money to prosecute the case; for the attorney fee, for \$50 per month while the suit is in process; for \$75 per month alimony for support of herself and child. The wife owns property in Forest Grove, and the doctor wanted \$2,000 equity in it, alleging that he expended that much in the place.

The couple were divorced in Washington, and afterward re-married. He says that at that time, in the property settlement, he gave her the equivalent of six or seven thousand dollars, and that he now has no means to pay alimony, and that his practice has been made un lucrative by reason of his wife's conduct. They have one child, a little daughter. Mrs. Wendt pleaded for custody of the child, while the husband wanted the right to visit it at any time.

Just before the case was called the property rights were settled out of court. Dr. Wendt was given the decree, and it is understood that Mrs. Wendt was given clearance to the home in the Grove—which is valued at several thousand dollars; the custody of the little daughter; and several hundred dollars in money.

The funeral was in Forest Grove, under the auspices of the G. A. R. and the Woman's Relief Corps.
