

## ALBERT L. WEST GETS XMAS PRESENT

Is Sentenced to Four Years and Then Extended a Parole

JUDGE OPENS GATE OF MERCY Rural Mail Carrier Gets Clemency on Former Good Reputation

Rural Mail Carrier Albert L. West, of Sherwood, spent Christmas Day in the county jail, filled with foreboding, for he was awaiting a sentence upon conviction of a statutory offense, the complaining witness being Mrs. Chas. Haines, who lived along the mail route on which West was wont to carry Uncle Sam's offerings. West's case was considered but a short time by the jury before the finding of guilty was made.

Judge Campbell came out Tuesday and held court, and West was brought before him for sentence. He was given four years and then the gate of mercy was opened, and the Court told him he was going to give him a chance because of his former good reputation, and because he believed that he would now become a good citizen, and remain so. The Court told him to go home to his wife and child and to follow the path of rectitude, and that nothing but a lapse from proper conduct would prevent him from enjoying his liberty. West was very much overcome at the outcome of the case, and promised that he would follow the suggestions of the Court to the letter.

He left for home on the first train, in company with his wife and child.

VOTED SPECIAL OF TEN MILLS Prevailing Tax is Five Mills, With More Districts to Come

Road Districts over Washington County have been voting for or against special road taxes for permanent road work the past two or three weeks, and there are yet more to hear from. ## DEATH OF MRS. BOOTH RECALLS A TRAGEDY

Widow of William W. Booth Died December 26th in Hillsboro

HUSBAND WAS KILLED IN 1905 Shot Down Sept. 30th of That Year by Sydney Brugger

Mrs. Ella F. Booth, widow of W. W. Booth, died at her home, 11th and Oak Streets, Hillsboro, December 26, 1919, of heart failure. Mrs. Booth has never been very strong and since her husband's death, September 30, 1905, has been gradually failing. Her husband, W. W. Booth, was a harness maker, and in 1905 conducted a harness shop where the Gross store now stands. He was shot and killed by Sydney Brugger, a weak-minded youth, on September 30, 1905, the motive being robbery. Mr. Booth was killed near the Fourth Street intersection of Main, and young Brugger robbed his victim and came back to the bakery and bought some cookies and left for Beaverton, where he was picked up by the sheriff next day and later convicted and sentenced for life. The funeral of Mrs. Booth took place yesterday afternoon. She leaves six children to mourn her loss: Mrs. Gertrude Munn, Seattle; Mrs. H. B. Westphal, Sacramento, Cal.; Mrs. C. M. Coon, Beatrice, Neb.; Mrs. Guy Powers, Mrs. Herbert Kafer and Miss Nettie M. Booth, all of Hillsboro. Deceased was 55 years of age, and was born in Wisconsin.
