GUARDIAN OF DEAD SUES THE CONDENSER

Asks \$7,500 Damages for Death of Gilbert Shaver

CLAIM THAT SHAFT WAS FAULTY

Lad was Crushed While Working on Elevator, November 1, 1910

D. J. Shaver, who was recently appointed guardian of the late Gilbert Shaver, who was killed in an elevator in the condenser at Forest Grove, has filed suit in the circuit court, asking damages in the sum of \$7,500, and the complaint names the Pacific Coast Condensed Milk Company and Benjamin Smith, foreman, as defendants. The complaint alleges that the boy was working in the factory, and that the foreman sent him to the upper floor, in the elevator, to get some empty can trays, and that in following the orders he was crushed in the lift. It is set out that the elevator had no gates or sides, or guards, and that the shaft was unprotected. The elevator was of the hydraulic variety, and the plaintiff contends that the company was careless and negligent in not having the transfer properly safe-guarded. It was reported at the time of the fatality that the boy boarded the elevator and was lying on its floor, face downward, as it was ascending, looking over the edge. As the lift passed through the upper floor, his body was caught between the floor and the base of the transfer, crushing out his life.
