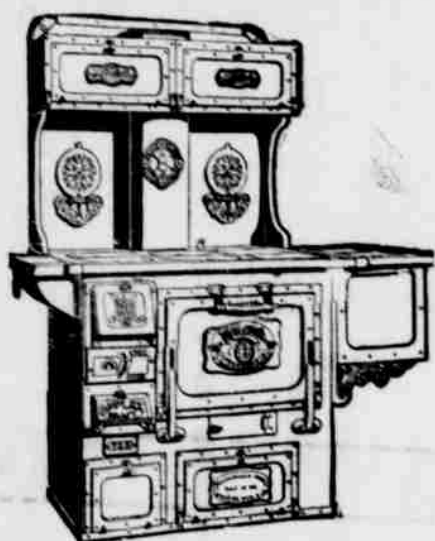

NEW OFFICERS ARE SWORN IN THIS WEEK

County Judge Sewell Succeeded
Judge Goodin Yesterday

BUT ONE NEW DEPUTY INSTALLED

Only Two new Officers as a Result of
the November Election

There was but little shifting
about in the official life in the
court house this week. On Tues-
day, John W. Sewell succeeded
Judge J. W. Goodin as county
judge, Clerk Bailey adminis-
tering the oath of office. Mr. Sew-
ell and Mr. Goodin went over
some of the business of the office
yesterday afternoon, and the new
county judge sat as one of the
commissioners' court, yesterday
and today.

Clerk Bailey succeeded himself
and Ed. C. Luce remains as his
chief and only deputy. Leo Per-
kins entered upon his official du-
ties as recorder of conveyances,
with O. W. Humphreys as his
deputy. A. A. Morrill, succeed-
ing himself as surveyor, has Geo.
Morrill as his deputy, while Wm.
Jackson, the county treasurer, as
usual, will conduct the office him-
self. Assessor Crandall holds
over under the new legislation.
Sheriff Hancock has retained
David Kuratli until he shall leave
for another pursuit. Really,
there were but two changes in
office—that of the recordership
and county judgeship.

FRUIT GROWERS MEET

The Apple Growers of Washing-
ton County held a very success-
ful meeting in the City Hall, in
this city, Saturday, December
30. About 25 growers from all
parts of the county were pres-
ent, and they are determined to
organize to protect their inter-
ests, and get a fair price for
their product.

Ferd Groner, elected tem-
porary Chairman some time ago,
sent word that it would be im-
possible for him to continue in
the office, as his other duties
practically took all of his time,
and he could not do the other of-
fice justice, so B. N. Sprout, of
Beaverton, was elected perma-
nent president, and A. E. Peat,
of Varley Station, was elected
permanent secretary. A com-
mittee was appointed, consisting
of John Forbis, of Dilley, Bernard
Leis and B. N. Sprout, of Bea-
verton, to look over the Consti-
tution and By-Laws of the Hood
River Apple Growers Ass'n., and
revise same to meet the condi-
tions as they found them in
Washington County.

It is the purpose of the Assoc-
iation to have a representative
from each apple growing district
in the county on the governing
board, to be known as Vice Pres-
idents, they to look after the
interests of the association in
their districts.

It is also the intention of the
association to send every man in
the county a special invitation to
attend the next meeting which
will be held in Hillsboro, the last
Saturday in January, at 1 o'clock
p. m., to attend this important
gathering, which is to elect the
rest of the officers, and also pass
on the constitution and by-laws,
which will be submitted by the
committee.

Every one growing apples is
invited to attend the above meet-
ing. N. H. Alexander, secretary
of the Hillsboro Board of Trade,
presided at the meeting Satur-
day.

O. B. Gates has closed a deal
whereby he gets water from the
Forest Grove water supply, com-
ing from upper Gales Creek, at
the rate of four cents per thou-
sand gallons. Mr. Gates is ap-
plying for a franchise for sup-
plying water to the residents of
Cornelius, and will later apply to
the council of Hillsboro for a like
franchise, contingent, of course,
upon his getting a large enough
service here to warrant con-
structing his pipe line into the
county seat. He states that he
can supply all needs and give
water for irrigation purposes.
He will also get a franchise from
the county, permitting him to
bury his pipes along the county
road leading from Forest Grove
this way. He says that Forest
Grove has an inestimable capaci-
ty, and there can be no shortage
of water. He expects to soon
see what demand he can fill in
Hillsboro.
