One hundred and forty-four democrats supported Taft's Canadian reciprocity bill in the National House, yesterday, as against seventy-eight republicans voting for the measure. The like has rarely been seen in Washington, and approaches the time when Congress stood together on the Spanish War proposition. Eighty-seven republicans stood with the protected interests, and these were aided by five lonesome democrats. The standpatters, as a rule, fought the measure, tooth and nail, and the significance of the splitting of party lines certainly means that a change has crept into our National politics, laying aside the merits of the measure; and assuming that it will be a doubtful experiment; and taking for granted that it will mean loss to America—the lesson of government is still there. And if the bill shall become law, and it is not as it should be in the ultimate, the standard of the times goes to show that Congress will get together for repeal without the "hanging fire" that in the past has obstructed legislation. It is a healthy sign, indeed, when the party which has been in power retreats from a President, while the aid of the opposition passes an executive measure.
