J. J. SMITH WRITES

J. J. Smith, who farmed on the North Plains for many years, writes the Argus:-

"I have been getting so many inquiries, lately, about this section, that it is a burden to answer all, and I will ask a little of your space, so all parties down your way, who are interested, may know conditions down here, as I see them after three months. Lebanon is 93 miles south of Portland; has a sea level of 336 feet, which is about 130 feet higher than Hillsboro; the Santiam flows just east of town, which has a population of from 2,000 to 2,500. The S. P. runs through here, and rural telephones reach nearly all the homes in the county. Lebanon has rural mail routes; a high school, a graded school, an Academy; 6 a graded school, an Academy; 6 churches; paper mill, employing 70 men; sash and door factory; electric light and water plant, city hall, 3 warehouses; 2 banks, 3 drug stores, 7 general stores; 3 feed stores; good hotel, 3 restaurants, 3 blacksmith shops, 3 livery and feed stables; 2 creaments, stations large sawmill are ery stations, large sawmill, etc.
The soil is a black candy loam.
It looks good to me—and that

is all I can say for that, for I've been here but a short time. Have purchased all my feed and seed for next Spring's seeding.
Oats from three different ranches weigh from 90 to 104 lbs. per sack, and they tell me they produce from 50 to 60 bushels per acre. Land sells from \$40 to \$150 per acre owing to nearness to town and improvements. This is about all I can say at this time. If any of my friends would wish more information would advise them to come up next Summer, when they can see crops growing and judge for themselves. I will be glad, however, to write any one who wishes to locate up here. My address is Lebanon, Ore., Route 2."
