KINTON LITERARY

The Kinton Literary Society gave a very interesting program last Friday evening, in observance of the birthdays of Lincoln and Washington. The school house was decorated in the National colors, and pictures of the famous presidents. There was music by the Kinton Band; an oration on Washington by Clara Anderson; recitation, Faye Kershaw; songs by Ivy Snyder, R. Bierly, Mrs. Kindt, and a chorus; recitations by Hillis Kindt, Eugene Richards, Alfred Richards, Victor Anieker, Edith VanKleeck, Ruth Richards; song, trio, by Helen Kennington, Ida Bucher and Myrtle Kershaw; cornet duet, Ward and Harold Cutting; drill by Uncle Sam (Carl Wedeking) and Harry and Alfred Richards; Victor and Adolf Anieker, Lester and Everet Snider, Hillis Kindt and Raymond Hanson.

C. E. Kindt delivered the patriotic address, and touched upon the name of Washington being so closely identified with our public institutions, the capital, a state, counties in nearly all states, and gave an account of the city named after the Father of the Country.
