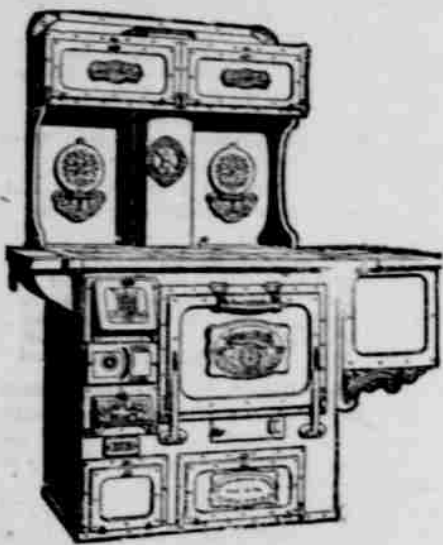

### FRUIT MEN ELECT DELEGATES TO ALBANY

Meeting at City Hall, Last Saturday, Was Well Attended

NEWELL AND FORBIS TO REPRESENT

Central Selling Agency will be Formulated for Western Oregon

The Washington County Fruit Growers' Union had a representative session at the city Hall last Saturday afternoon. The committee reported the Walla Walla meeting, held February 28, and Hon. W. K. Newell, of near Gaston, and J. F. Forbis, of Dillley, were elected delegates to attend the Albany meeting, tomorrow, for the purpose of formulating plans, in conformity with the Walla Walla suggestion, to establish a central selling agency for Willamette Valley fruit.

Fruit men generally are enthusiastic over the development of orchards in Washington County, and they are taking more interest in organization than heretofore. Secretary A. E. Peat, of Hillsboro, Route 4, states that he gets many inquiries as to prospective work of the union.

The report of N. H. Alexander, of the Hillsboro Board of Trade, as to the exhibit at the Portland Apple Show, last Fall, was read and adopted and the final chapter closed.

Apple growers are enthusiastic that the Union shall enter all competitive exhibits held next Fall, and they feel that with care and prudence we shall capture merited prizes.
