RAILROADS PAY IN BIG MONEY

Corporations Pay About 1-12th of Total Tax Collected

TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS

This is on Railroad Track, Right of Way and Equipment

The railroad corporations in Washington County pay practically one-twelfth of the total tax collected this year—and this taxation is on the roadbed, right of way, depot buildings and rolling stock, along, to say nothing of the tax paid on timber lands by the O. & C. land department. In other words, the railway companies are paying one dollar where all the rest of the taxpaying properties pay eleven dollars. The higher assessments have meant a great deal to the commonwealth, for in olden days, years ago, the corporations were a little shy on contributing a just share of the burdens of government. The tax roll shows that the various lines have paid this year as follows:
