TWO ELECTRIC LINES WILL LINK TOGETHER

United and Oregon Electric to
Have Artery Established

VALLEY FREIGHT GOES THROUGH

Orengo and Helvetia to be Tied by Line
is Proposal of Co.

The Hill system proposes in the not distant future to tie together the Oregon Electric system and the United Railways by a line leaving the Oregon Electric somewhere between Garden Home and Forest Grove, to tap the United somewhere in the Helvetia section. Orengo is now the proposed point on the Electric, but this may be changed. The idea is to route all valley freight from Garden Home via the proposed cut-off to the United, and from there send through to Vancouver, where it will be yarded and sent on its Eastern destination, and the same will apply to West-bound freight, destined for Washington County and Willamette Valley points south of Portland.

Mr. Hill, through Stevens, says he does not know just when the new artery will be built, but it is one of the contemplative projects of the Hill system, which is now entering the rich Southern Oregon district after freight and passenger business.

There is some hope here that the United will build from Hillsboro in conformity with the franchise under which the line crept out of Portland into the Tualatin Valley.

Her clothing was burned almost off from the waist to her neck, and it was only by strenuous efforts that the injuries were not sufficiently severe to be fatal.
