In the passing of Mrs. Rebecca Lawson Tongue, Washington county loses a remarkable woman. For over 50 years she presided at the one hearthstone; she lived to see an only son distinguished among his fellows; a counsellor in National affairs; a Representative of a Congressional district in extent as large as several New England states—a man who would have been U. S. Senator but for the sudden passing which checked a brilliant career. In this son was a mother's fondest ambition filled to repletion, and she lived, not only to see him pass, but to see his children grown to manhood and womanhood, and taking their places in the affairs of men and people. With her last sleep ended a well rounded life.

The decision of Judge Wolverton is far reaching in its effect, and if the millions of acres of grants go back to Uncle Sam it will mean that a vast domain will be settled, by home holders, either by purchase or homesteading—presumably by the latter, as in the Flathead and other big reserves. But it will be some years before it shall come to a final decision—for it will be carried to the supreme court. We'll not settle and build our cabins next year.

Hillsboro is just commencing to move ahead, and when we shall have civic improvements worth while; and when our large tracts, surrounding the town, are cut up and inhabited by small home holders; when we get two or three good manufacturing plants; sawmills, etc., we shall soon be a city of some importance. It now looks like 5,000 in two years—and this is putting it mildly.

The city did well to employ Mr. Kelsey as a civil engineer to inaugurate improvements. He knows his work thoroughly, and while he might have put in a bid that was not as cheap as some his work will mean a saving in the long run.

PROCLAMATION

Whereas on the 15th day of February 1911 an initiative petition was filed with the Recorder of the City of Hillsboro, Washington County, Oregon, proposing a Bill for an Act to incorporate the City of Hillsboro, and repealing all Acts, and parts of Acts, in conflict therewith, and praying that said measure be submitted to the legal voters of the City of Hillsboro for their approval or rejection, at a special election to be held in said City on the 13th day of April, A. D. 1911; And, whereas, said petition, and proposed measure, were in due form, as required by the ordinances of said City of Hillsboro, and by the laws of the State of Oregon; and the same was, on said February 15, 1911, adopted, approved, and ordered submitted to the legal voters of said City by a resolution of the council of said City, such election to be held on April 17, 1911; and Whereas, said proposed Bill for an Act to incorporate the City of Hillsboro, and repealing all Acts, and parts of Acts, in conflict therewith, was duly submitted to the legal voters of the City of Hillsboro, Washington County, Oregon, at a special election held therein on said April 17, 1911, and the said vote having been officially canvassed and certified, and appearing that said measure received 28 affirmative votes and 15 negative votes, and one blank vote, and that the total number of votes cast at said election was 43;

Now, therefore, I, H. T. Bagley, Mayor of the City of Hillsboro, Washington County, Oregon, in obedience to and by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by the ordinances of said City, and by the laws of the State of Oregon, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the City of Hillsboro, Washington County, Oregon, and do hereby announce and declare that said Bill for an Act to incorporate the City of Hillsboro, and repealing all Acts, and parts of Acts, in conflict therewith, received an affirmative majority of all effective votes cast at said election, and that said measure shall be in full force and effect, as the charter of said City, from the date of said election whereby it was adopted by the people of said city.

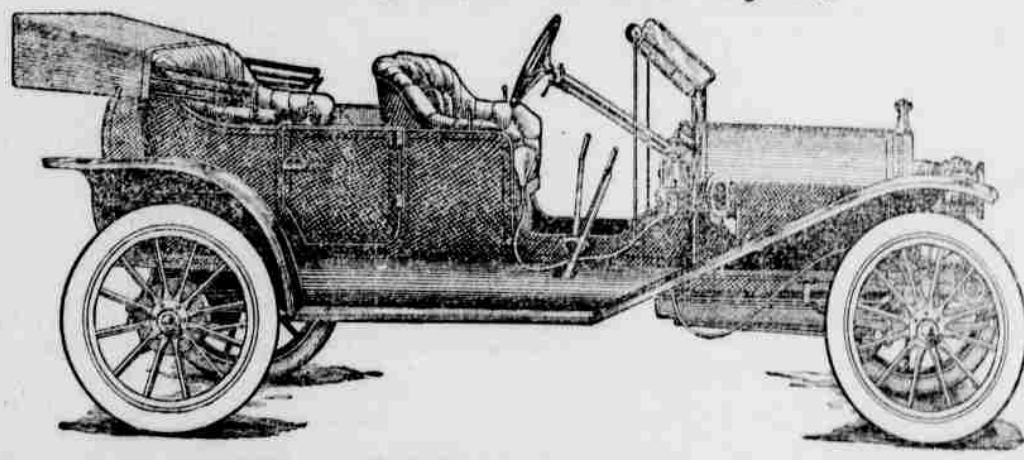
