SCHOOL BONDS FOR BUILDING ARE DEFEATED

Majority Registered Against New and Necessary Building

ANOTHER ELECTION WILL BE ORDERED

Warm Day, and General Apathy was Taking Siesta in Tent

The proposition to bond the Hillsboro school district for \$50,000 to purchase a site and erect a new school building was defeated at the election Monday, and the school board will order another election as soon as the law will permit. The opposition banked its argument on the site of the new building, and there was also some opposition because of the amount of the proposed bond issue. Many contended that it was a foregone conclusion that the new structure would be in the Hillsboro Garden Tracts—because Mr. Jacobs had incidentally offered to make concessions if the property were located west of the P. R. & N.

The affirmative vote was ahead until the tellers got fairly into the count, but the negative then made a spurt and caught up, finally landing ten to the good. There were 75 votes against and 65 votes for the question.

The members of the school board expect to call another election in the near future, and when this is done more than likely the matter of site will be dwelt upon.

Many in the country district to the north voted "No" because they felt that their children had made the trip to the present site long enough, and they wanted the site located in North Hillsboro somewhere.

Others fought the measure on the grounds of taxation.

The school board, however, desires to build such a building as will meet the exigencies of the occasion and make Hillsboro an educational center, and if Hillsboro grows as expected the new building will not be amiss. Every member of the school board avers that nothing had been decided as to the site, and they wish it to be where a majority of the people want it.
