

ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETINGS HOLD ON JUNE 19

Supt. Case Writes Open Letter to School Patrons

ASKS FOR INTEREST IN AFFAIRS

Suggests That Housewives go and Prepare Dinner for Voters

The Annual School Meeting will be held on June 19th for the purpose of electing a school clerk and one or more directors in each school district in the county. It is recommended by our Superintendent of Public Instruction, L. R. Alderman, that the housewives in every district meet at the school house and prepare a dinner for the legal voters and require them to come to the school house for their dinners or go hungry. The voters once there and well fed will be prepared to enter upon the duties of providing for an A1 school for the coming year. In a majority of our school districts the clerk submits a report of the year's receipts and disbursements by placing on the blackboard a complete statement of moneys received and paid out. It is customary in a majority of our school districts for the voters to select a committee of three to audit the books of the school clerk and thus avoid any errors in the accounts in the expenditure of school funds. Last year over \$145,000 was expended on the schools of Washington County, but less than 48 per cent. of this was paid for teachers' salaries. Publicity of the expenditure of school money will in this way insure economy and bring value received for funds expended. While at the school meeting the premises should be carefully inspected and improvements planned toward making the place where our boys and girls are to spend more than half their waking hours during the coming year comfortable, attractive and healthful. Is the school room grimy and dirty? Are the window shades down and the window lights out? Is there provision for proper ventilation other than opening doors and windows? Are the out-buildings sour and foul with disease germs? Is the drinking water impure? Are there walks around the buildings to prevent mud being carried in to the school room on rainy days? If we would not sacrifice the health of our children, parents should go to the school meeting and see that the premises are put in proper condition and kept so during the school year.

Then, again, has our school been what we wanted it to be during the past year? Have we had the best teacher our money would warrant, and have our teachers received the encouragement they should have had in the important work we have entrusted to their care? If not, is it not our fault that we have not visited the school and attended the annual school meetings. These are questions that it would be well for parents to consider. This is a matter of business that is of vital importance. Let us learn from the past and lend our help toward insuring better conditions for the future.

Remember that June 19th is annual school meeting day.

Sposito has been serving time for assault, and has been in the county jail for some months. He is soon to be liberated, and while he was in custody the Olneys brought suit to quiet the leasehold.

EUGENE S. JACKSON

Eugene S. Jackson, well known in Hillsboro, and Washington County, died at the Veterans' Home, Napa County, Cal., May 26, 1911. Deceased was born in Harrison County, Indiana, and came to Oregon with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hyer Jackson, in 1854. His father, Hon. Hyer Jackson, was County Judge of Washington County for two terms, commencing with 1862, and was county treasurer at his death. Deceased belonged to the Oregon Volunteers, during the Civil War, and was in the same company with Alonzo Sigler, of this city. Mr. Jackson went to the Yountville Soldiers' Home last Winter. Of his immediate family one brother, P. M. Jackson, and one sister, Mrs. Sarah Emrick, of Portland, and now in California, survive.

He leaves one child, Mrs. Norma E. Link, of Spokane, Wash. The funeral took place, May 29, with full military honors. Commandant Chas. A. Woodruff, of the Home, notified Preston Jackson of the death, the first of the week.

For many years after leaving Washington County Jackson mined and prospected in the Methow and Okanogan country, Washington. He was well known in this section of Washington County, having lived here many years. He was wedded to Mary Beauchamp, daughter of the late Tilden Beauchamp, the wife dying many years ago.

CITY ADVERTISES FOR SEALED BIDS

Will Open and Award Contracts for Sewage and Paving, June 17

JUST SIXTY DAYS AFTER ELECTION

If Bids are not Rejected Means Work Completed by Fall

The city council met last evening and ordered advertisements for bids for street paving and for a dual sewer system. Bids will be received up to June 17, and then opened and contracts awarded if the proposals are within reason. The advertisements appear in this issue of the city newspapers. This will bring the opening of bids within sixty days from the date of the charter election. If contracts are awarded it should mean that Hillsboro will have paved streets and a sewer system, by the time the Fall rains set in. It is the intention to have the sewer in the paved district started before paving, and then work can proceed rapidly. This will enable contractors to start paving early and get through while there is good weather.

Mayor Bagley and Recorder Bowman reported that they had settled with D. P. Correia, for a site for the septic tank, and right of way through the land to the drain, for \$425, and had received a deed and easement for the same. A warrant was ordered drawn for the amount.

The street committee was authorized to see that electric light poles are set as staked by the engineer. Both sewage ordinances were passed, and there was no opposition.

The council voted to accept Engineer Kelsey's offer to provide plans and specifications for improvement of the city park, the same being so arranged that work can be followed, year after year, the expense to be \$100 for the plans. The sanitary committee was instructed to look after a vent, near Lincoln Street, which gives out odors that remind one of a tannery, or glue factory.
