The "power of the press" has been plainly exemplified in the election of Rushlight for Mayor of Portland. Both big dailies were against him from the primaries up, although the Oregonian led after Simon came out independent. The Journal played second violin, and at the last minute, cast a doubt, showing that the paper realized it had driven in wrong. In the residence district on the East Side Rushlight carried practically two to one, and it will now be some years before we hear of the "mightiness" of Li'l Joe."

It is absurd for the Puget Sound newspapers to continually "crab" about Portland. The Rose City will build each year more mightily than any other Pacific Coast city, San Francisco not excepted. 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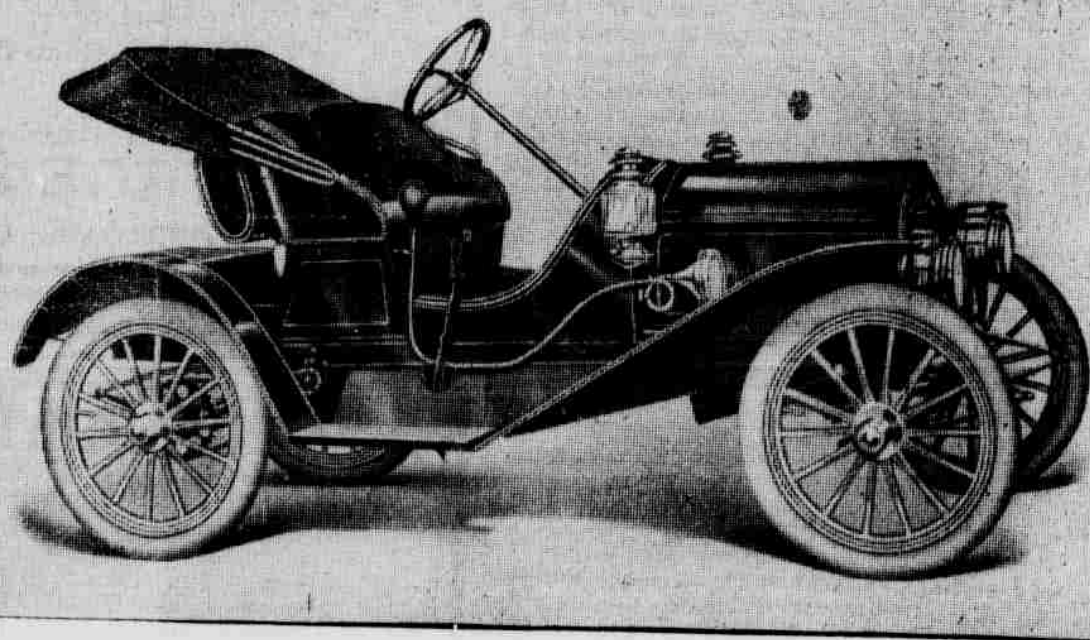

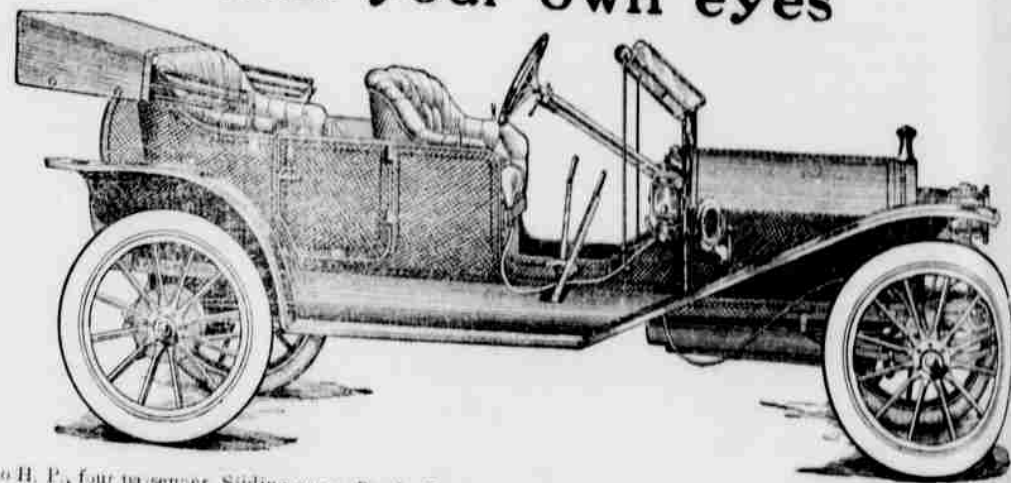
