

## FRANK WESTHOFF STRUCK AND KILLED

Hit Near Bergen Place, Moffat,  
Tuesday Evening, After Seven

WAS INDUSTRIOUS GERMAN BACHELOR

Aged 51 Years, and Lived With Brother,  
William, Near Elmonica

Frank Westhoff, a native of Germany, and residing for years with his brother, William, near Elmonica Station, on the Oregon Electric, was struck by an electric car Portland bound, on the John D. Bergen place, a short distance east of Moffat station, Tuesday night, shortly after seven o'clock. Westhoff was rendered unconscious and was taken to Portland, where he died yesterday morning, about seven o'clock. He had with him a draft or certificate of deposit on Ladd & Tilton.

Westhoff was a good business man, but his friends think he had been despondent for some time, and was brooding over some imaginary trouble. He was walking along the track, going toward Sewell station, and he was seen by John D. Bergen, who states that he was looking up at the wires when the car rounded the curve.

The dead man made frequent trips to Hillsboro, but no one appears to have seen him the day of the accident.

A brother, Max Westhoff, resides near Cedar Mill, on Portland Route 2. Westhoff was born about 50 years ago, and moved into the section between Cedar Mill and Elmonica, years ago, when the country was yet undeveloped. He became a citizen of the United States several years ago.

No blame is attached to the motorman, as he had whistled before rounding the curve, and it appeared as though Westhoff made no effort to get out of the way.

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## BRIDGE CONTRACTS LET BY CO. BOARD

Contractor Loring Gets the Dil-  
ley-Hughes Bridge

POTTS GET SPRING HILL CONTRACT

Supt. Vandehy's Report Shows Ten In-  
mates at County Farm

The county board met yesterday morning, and is grinding away on routine work. Surveyor McGee and Viewers Thos. Connell and J. A. Imbrie, after a week on the Tigard-Rex road survey, have made a favorable report, but the court as yet has taken no action. From what can be heard here and there it now looks as though the auto people will have a hard time to raise the several thousand dollars to fix up the road so that autos can travel into Yamhill on this highway.

It is also said that the Gaston people are objecting to county aid, as they say few Washington County people use the Rex road, while many use the Laughlin gap road, above Gaston, and they think that this thoroughfare should first be put into shape by Yamhill county.

J. S. Loring, contractor, was given the Hughes bridge, near Dilley, at the figure of \$495. Other bids—J. M. Hiatt, \$828; R. F. Reasoner, \$624.40; C. E. Potts, \$578.29.

The Spring Hill bridge and repairs went to C. E. Potts, Gales Creek, for the bid of \$208.05. Other bids—J. S. Loring, \$325; Reasoner, \$318.11.

Supt. Vandehy in his bill shows that the county farm now has 10 regular dependents, and for these he receives \$10 per month, except in cases where extra care is needed. Fruit Inspector Galloway makes a comprehensive report, and puts in a bill for \$93.40 for labor and expenses, and extra help, cutting orchards, etc., at \$43.90.

Recorder Perkins reports May fees at \$695.20, and Clerk Bailey collected May fees in the sum of \$580.

The board went out to the Scotch church this morning to inspect the bridge recently finished by Contractor Potts.

Road work will be taken up today and tomorrow, the court being busy with hearing supervisors yesterday.

### SPLENDID WATER SUPPLY

E. A. Sprague, of Portland, has just completed a well, 27 feet in depth, on the Hillsboro Garden Tracts, for the Oregon & Washington Corporation, and when at that depth struck a low affording 350 gallons per minute for a 24-hour stretch of pumping. The pump is electric, and is a \$700 concern. Mr. Sprague says he has struck an underground river, and there is water enough to supply a city of over ten thousand people. He has walled the well with brick and cement a foot in thickness, and built a pump house over the supply.

The water will be conducted through the huge filter, near the Second Street plant, and he says that it will beat Bull Run for purity and coldness.

The vein was a surprise to Mr. Sprague, as he expected to go deeper. The supply is crystalline in appearance, and it appears as though the vein has worked in from the mountains. From all indications the channel has been there for thousands of years, and it is about on a level with the bed of the Tualatin River.

The company will dress up the appearance of their tract surrounding the water supply, and make it very attractive. Sprague started one well on the Garden Tracts, but found that he had to get back on the hill a greater distance. The river bed is meshed in a sand similar to that on the coast, and Mr. Sprague says that the water supply of the city is now assured beyond a doubt.
