

LAST OF MERCER EXCURSION PASSES

John Wilson, Seattle, Brother of Sherburne Wilson, Hillsboro

SAILED AROUND HORN IN SIXTY-SIX

Was Married Before "Cargo" of Wives Sailed From East

John Wilson, who with his wife, was a passenger on the old ship, Continental, which left New York in 1866, with a cargo of 300 women, for wives for Seattle and Tacoma bachelors, died June 5, and was buried June 8, in the afternoon. He was a brother of Sherburne Wilson, who lived in Hillsboro for many years, and who still retains his property in North Hillsboro. The dead man was married 14 years before the Continental sailed out of New York, and the trip to Seattle was made through the Straits of Magellan. The cargo was the result of an expedition organized by A. S. Mercer, in 1865. Mercer was president of the Washington Territorial University, and he conceived the idea of bringing out a lot of New England school-ma'ams to later become wives of the early settlers. Mrs. Wilson had hemorrhages of the lungs, and the Wilsons, husband and wife, took the trip in hopes of beneficial results.

The wife died December 17, 1910, her health returning to her after reaching the coast.

The famous expedition had the support of Gov. Andrews, of Massachusetts, and Edward Everett Hale endorsed the scheme. Nearly all the teachers married, and became mothers of men famous in Washington State history.

John Wilson was born in Vermont, Sept. 29, 1820. Sherburne Wilson, the brother, is the last survivor of his father's family, and he now resides at 824 Patton Avenue, Portland.


