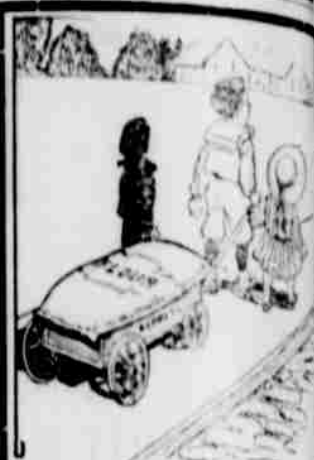

H. Behrman, the Corn catcher, was down to the Tuesday evening.

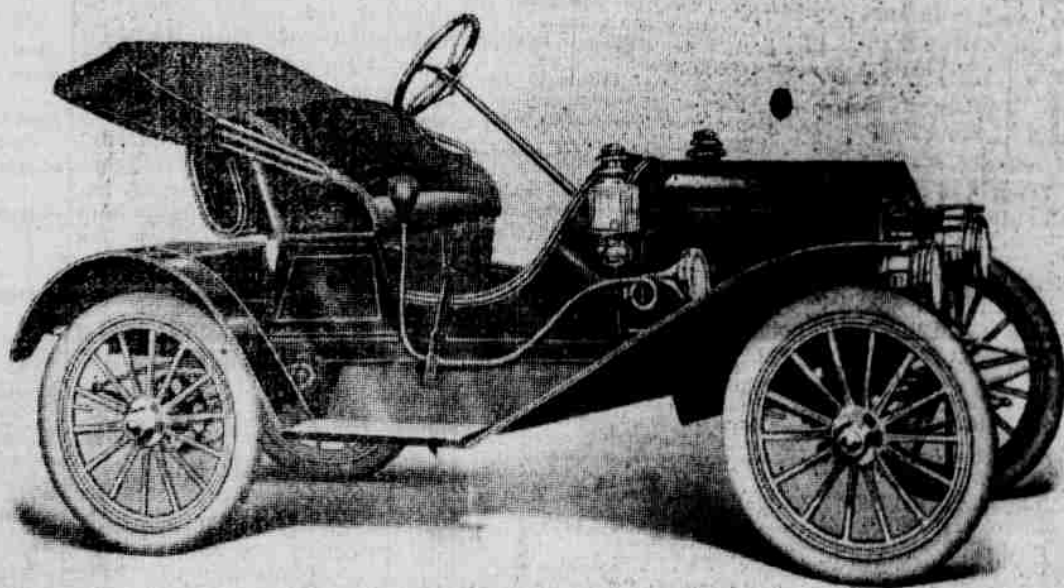
Antone Hermens, of Vesper, was down to the city Tuesday greeting friends.
