When the panic of 1907 struck the nation it will be remembered that Oregon kept on doing business at the old stand, and there was no cessation of development in all lines of business. This was largely due to the splendid resources of the Pacific Coast states; and to the fact that the big scare does not enter the heart of the average Westerner as quickly as back in the East, where, while wild animals are few and far between, the average man would go into hysterics if a rabbit ran against his leg in the night time. But above all this, the fact that men of means kept on putting their money into enterprises, without stint. These actions are characteristic of the West, and the present depression in the East, due to the rabbit-eyed, over the impending reciprocity bill, will not at all enter into business conditions on the slope. With good crop prospects from Ashland to Astoria; Baker to Buxton; and Coos to Clatskanie—Oregon will "keep on smiling."

Fire Chief "Dave" Campbell, who died at his post at a fire in Portland, the other day, had scores of intimate friends in this city, and they all sympathize with Mrs. Campbell in her bereavement. Death as it came to him had its element of glory—for he died as he had lived, fearing neither man nor danger. No one here who knows Dave Campbell will believe anything else but that he went into the flames thinking that some of his men were past the danger line. A faithful public servant; a big hearted man; conscientious in his duty, his manner of death but accentuates the spirit which moved him when life mingled with his fellows. Taking it, by and large, the religion that would, under the circumstances, bestow a question of doubt on the future of brave and manly "Dave" Campbell, would be too narrow for circumspection.
