COUNCIL SETS JULY 17TH FOR HEARINGS

Have Made all Assessments for Pavings and Sewage

COUNTY WILL PAY THE HEAVIEST Will Pay From Ten to Twelve Thousand Dollars for Improvements

A crew of accountants under the direction of Hon. W. N. Barrett, Mayor Bagley and Recorder Bowman, have been busy for many days, making the assessments on property for the purpose of payment for paving and sewage, and it has been a great task. The city fathers met Monday evening and designated the evening of July 17th as the time for hearing objections to the computations.

Washington County is the hardest hit of any property holders, as there is an entire block of paving to consider, to say nothing of the sewage. The county will have anywhere from ten to twelve thousand dollars for the work. W. V. Wiley is another heavy payer.

The Argus is this week publishing the paving assessments for Main and Second Streets, as well as the assessments for the storm sewer. Just as soon as the hearings are over the city will proceed to arrange for the money for bonds, as it is stated that a number wish to take up the proposition of ten equal payments. Many will do this, while others will pay cash. Contractors have arranged for money to finance their work until the city or property owners have the necessary coin.

Recorder Bowman was authorized to get the city lien books in shape, and to employ aid in getting them all in readiness by the time the assessments are adjusted, if it be necessary for any changes.

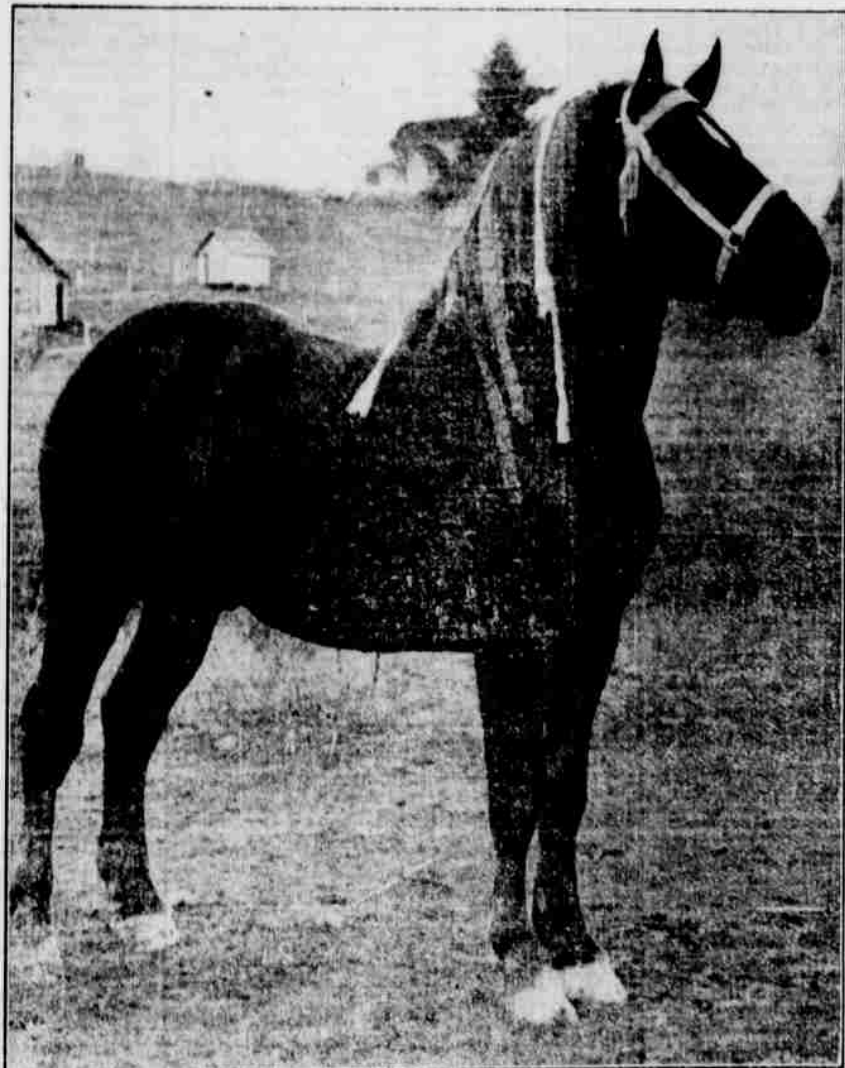
