

JURY ACQUITS JIMMY WILSON OF ASSAULT

Famous Case of Husband Kidnapping Wife Settled Tuesday

CHARGE WAS ASSAULT AND BATTERY

Young Wife Will now Proceed With Divorce Case in Circuit Court

A jury of six decided Tuesday afternoon that Jas. Wilson was not guilty of assault and battery on his wife, the star witness for the prosecution before Judge DeWitt Smith. It will be remembered that Jimmy Wilson and Vida Lewis were married early in May, and that after the ceremony the wife went home, leaving Wilson to live his solitary life. Wilson was denied the Lewis home, and he waited until his bride should arrive at eighteen years of age. Shortly after the bride's 18th birthday Wilson met his wife and a Miss Cameron, who were out for a walk. He hastily placed his wife in an automobile, and had the driver take them to the Tom Bailey ranch, near West Union. A warrant of arrest followed, and the couple were brought in a week ago Monday by Constable McQuillan.

At the trial Tuesday Mrs. Wilson swore that Wilson picked her up, and she testified that she screamed. Miss Cameron also testified that he parted them and bodily placed the wife in the car; and that Mrs. Wilson cried out. This, however, the defendant, as well as Lee Sears, denied. One of the Kineman brothers, for the state, swore that the driver had told him that Mrs. Wilson had "fought" on the way out. Sears did not go on in rebuttal, but he states he meant it was a fight of words.

The jury was out about a half hour before a verdict was reached. Attorney Geo. R. Bagley defended Wilson, and some of the passages between counsel and the state's attorney were full of pepper. T. H. Tongue prosecuted. The jury: Jerome Palmateer, John Dennis, Robt. Faltrampf, Ed. Shute, August Tews and G. A. Frost.

Wilson is now a free man and the next move on the chess-board of law is eagerly watched. Within a day or so the defendant's time for answering the divorce case will be at hand.

SPLENDID PIONEER WOMAN PASSES

Mrs. Phebe Kindt, of Kinton, Died Wednesday Morning, June 28

CROSSED THE PLAINS IN FIFTY-THREE

Was a Woman of Sterling Character, and Beloved in Community

Mrs. Phebe Davies Kindt, of Kinton, died at her home, Wednesday morning, June 28, 1911, after an illness covering an extended period. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Miles Davies, and was born in Elkhart County, Indiana, April 30, 1837. She was married to Peter Kindt, April 7, 1853, and the young couple, in company with the Davies' family, started to cross the plains to Oregon. They were six months on the trip, and arrived in Oregon in the Fall, where Mr. Kindt took up a donation of 320 acres, at Kinton, and on which Mrs. Kindt spent her entire life. She had been a member of the Christian Church, at Farmington, for 45 years, and was one of the first to take up and foster the pioneer association, meeting at the first organization, and never missing an annual session until this year.

Of her immediate family she leaves four brothers and one sister—Alfred Davies, Portland; H. G. Davies, Portland; Wm. Davies, Ringgold, Ohio; A. N. Davies, Kinton, and Mrs. C. F. Royal, of Salem. She is survived by the following children: John O. Kindt, Nanton, Alberta, Canada; Mrs. Dora Elliott, Kiona, Wash., and C. E. Kindt, of Kinton, the latter two of whom have been at the mother's bedside for several weeks.

Mrs. Kindt, was a woman of much force of character, and she grained and held the esteem and friendship of a large circle of friends during her fifty-eight years of residence in the neighborhood.

The funeral took place this afternoon, Rev. J. F. Ghormley, of Portland Central Christian Church, officiating, assisted by Rev. Samuel Conklin, of Tigard. Mrs. O. B. Gates sang a solo, accompanied on the piano by Miss Wilma Waggener. Interment was in Crescent View Cemetery.
