SCHULMERICH BLOCK TO BE MODERNIZED Will be Made One of Handsomest in the City ADDITION WILL BE CONSTRUCTED Architects Now Planning—Commercial Bank to Occupy Corner

Ed. Schulmerich, who is heavily interested in the Schulmerich Block, and his associates, have architects at work arranging a plan for the entire modernization of the big brick on the southwest corner of Main and Second, now occupied by Connell and Co., and it is figured that remodeling, together with the new extensions, will involve an expenditure of from ten to fifteen thousand dollars. The exterior is entirely to be changed in appearance; more floor space is to be added; and it is expected that arrangements will be made with interested parties to make more room for the post office, and to enclose under brick the Tongue property adjoining on the South.

When completed the Commercial Bank will occupy the corner, as their present quarters are too cramped.

The Schulmerich block was built in 1890, and hundreds of thousands of dollars have passed over the counters since it was first occupied. For many years the Schulmerich store was in the East room, and the pharmacy in the West. Later a warehouse addition was built, and Connell & Co. have occupied it since the sale was made to them. The upper story will be modernized in every respect, and when completed it will compare with any of the Main street or Second street structures.
