Sherwood Hotel was Threatened, but Saved by Hard Work

TWO SALOONS AND LIVERY BURN

Flames Broke About Three O'clock Tuesday Morning

Sherwood had a five thousand dollar blaze Tuesday morning, the flames starting in the Meltzer livery barn, about 3 o'clock in the morning, supposedly catching from some one sleeping in the mow of the stable, presumably from a pipe.

A. L. Hager and M. and C. Meltzer slept in the barn, and they were awakened by the flames. They loosened all the horses and turned them out, all escaping except a valuable driving animal owned by Robt. Colfelt. The livery was burned and also the barber shop, and the saloons operated by Colfelt and A. Zin.

The entire business section was threatened, and the Sherwood Hotel was saved only after dint of hard fighting.

The loss will doubtless reach \$5000. Jack Weston owned the barber shop.
