WILL VOTE ON A NEW SCHOOL BUILDING

District Board has Posted Notices
Calling for Election

TO VOTE FORTY-FIVE THOUSAND

Or Again Turn Down the Bonding
Proposition, August 8

The Hillsboro School directors and Clerk Boscow have posted notices calling for a bond election, to be held at the school building, August 8, 1911, for the purpose of voting for or against spending \$45,000 for a school site, new building, heating and ventilating plant, and furniture and apparatus for the same. The polls will be open at one o'clock, and will remain open until four, thus giving all a chance to express their convictions. The vote will therefore be by ballot, and it is thought that this time the measure will carry. A few weeks ago the project, calling for \$50,000, was voted down by a narrow margin.

A week before the election the school directors will publish an outline of the proposed structure, and have something to say as to the possibilities of sites, and what the district will have to pay. There is absolutely no question but what the district must have a larger amount of school room, and a new building is the only solution.

Much of the opposition against the proposed structure at the last school meeting was not of a determined character—the real motive of the negative vote being largely one of choice of location. The site, if the election is carried, will most likely be north of Main Street, somewhere, and prices of tracts are now being procured so all can be advised on election day.

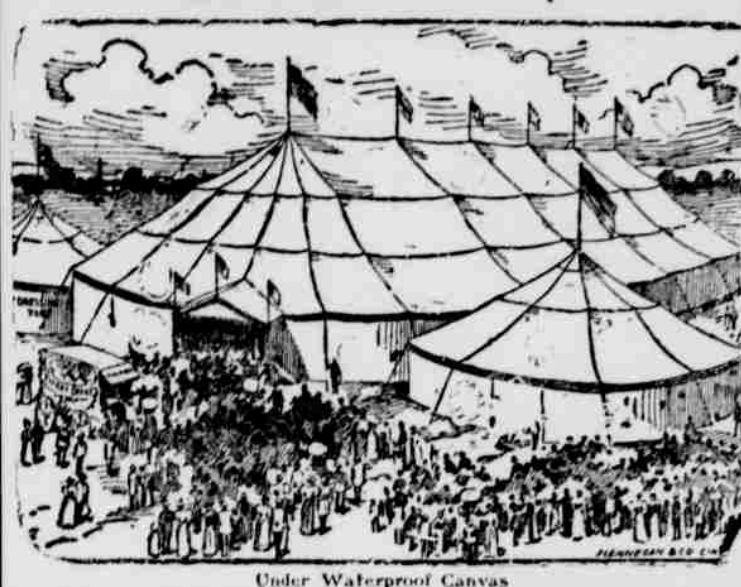
