Hugh Brady, Portland Diver, Fails to Raise Corpse

STREAM DYNAMITED LAST SUNDAY

Diver Thinks That Young Man is Not in the Tualatin

Hugh Brady, the famous Portland diver, gave up the search for the body of Percy Jaquith, at Scholls, the last of the week, after thoroughly searching the stream with grappling hooks. The next day, under Brady's advice—this was the fifth day after he was supposed to have drowned—dynamite was used all along the stream in the hopes that the body would be brought to the surface.

It is possible that the young man is not drowned, and that he cut the path through the brush and left his clothing on the bank to cover a disappearance, and is gone away. Some days prior his disappearance he talked of going to the harvest fields in Eastern Oregon, and this, coupled with the rumor that a revolver is missing from his effects, lead many to suppose that the placing of the clothes on the banks of the Tualatin might have been a blind.

Young Jaquith has always borne a splendid reputation, and has always been straightforward, and those who know him the closest aver that he would do nothing of this kind. Others, however, refuse to believe that he is drowned, and think he will turn up some time in the future. Others think that the young man suffered some personal disappointment, and he has taken this means to slip away.
