### HILLSBORO PIONEER BLACKSMITH DEAD

George Crowden Passes Away at Arcata, Humboldt Co., California

SETTLED IN HILLSBORO IN FIFTY-SEVEN

Taught Late Riley Cave the Blacksmith Trade in Sixties

John George Crowden, who came to Hillsboro in 1857, and opened a blacksmith shop, died at Arcata, Humboldt Co., Cal., July 12, 1911, from an attack of bladder and kidney trouble. He was born in Lincolnshire, England, March 1, 1829, and at death was aged 82 years, 4 months and 11 days. He came to the coast via the Horn, on the Steamship Columbia, and worked here at his trade, doing wagon work, and also was a special deputy sheriff, and at times assisted in the collection of taxes. He enlisted in the Oregon regiment during the Civil War, and was promoted to Sergeant, and was active during the Indian Wars. He was first married to Charlotte DeGraff, in New York, in 1852, and by this wife two children survive: Mrs. Elizabeth Duffy, San Francisco, and Mrs. Annie Monette, Eureka, Cal. March 12, 1863, he was wedded to Miss Hannah Sigler, at Hillsboro, the bride being a sister of Alonzo and James Sigler, both residing here at this time. The widow and the following children survive: Chas. L. and John Edward Crowden, Blue Lake, Cal.; Mrs. Julia Martin, Eureka, Cal.; Eugene and Gertrude Crowden, of Arcata. Deceased was an honorary member of the San Francisco Volunteer Fire Department; was a member of the G. A. R., under whose auspices his funeral took place.

He was well known to the old pioneers of this county, and taught the late Riley Cave the blacksmith trade in this city in the early sixties.

It is said that he installed the first top-signal at the entrance of Humboldt Bay, Cal., and helped put in the first band-saw mill in the redwood lumber district of the Humboldt section.

Crowden made the first steel cell for Washington County, and the cage is still in use in the rear of the county jail.

And with this ebullition, the knight of the road passed on up to North Yamhill. And thus was another Horace Greeley nipped by the frost of riotous and ribald wit.

Mrs. Pulver was unable to pulverize her antagonist, and therefore brought the case into Justice Smith's court, where the mother of the girl put up cash bail to appear later.
