OVER 500 TRACTS ARE ON DELINQUENT LIST

Old Law Requiring Advertisement of Delinquent List Restored

LIST OF 1910 IS UNUSUALLY LARGE

Very Few Have Heavy Taxation, However Many Small Tracts

The delinquent list of property upon which no taxes have as yet been paid since the rolls opened last Spring, appears in the Argus and Forest Grove News-Times, this week, and will run for four weeks. There are about 550 tracts which went delinquent April 4, 1911, and the county charges 10 per cent. penalty and one per cent. monthly, since delinquency, and the owner must also pay the costs of advertising. Under the law the publication of the list goes to the two official papers of the county.

There are very few large tracts, with heavy tax, in the list, the great majority being small tracts and lots in the towns and cities, and a few lots in Beuson and Hyde Park, down on the Portland mountain.

It has been several years since there has been publication of the delinquent list, and the new law was passed by the last session of the legislature.

That a party's name is on the delinquent list, however, is no sign that that particular person is delinquent, for many of the charges are where property has changed hands prior to last tax-paying time.

Among the score of names given farms around the countryside one of the best farms in Washington County has a name that is rather paradoxical. T. W. Sain's fine place, above Gaston, has been given the appellation of "Hardscrabble," but a look at the place would convince anyone that a person would not have to scabble very hard to make a piece of money on the ranch.
