## MRS. GEORGIA SHEPARD SUES PERE SHEPARD

Asks Multnomah Circuit Court to Give Her Some Big Money

FRIENDS GLORY IN HER PLUCK

Swears That She and Shepard Were Happy Until Father Came

Mrs. Georgia Young Shepard, wife of Fred Shepard, of South Cornelius, has sued the husband's father, Alfred D., for \$100,000 for alienation of the husband's affections—and thereby hangs a tale. In 1894 Miss Young married Fred Shepard, who was a son of one of Georgia's first families. They moved to the Paul Reimer's ranch, a little southwest of Cornelius, and were as happy as two mortals could be until Mr. and Mrs. Shepard, father and mother of the husband, came upon the scene. Shepard Sr. had originally bought the Reimers' place of 80 acres, and when he sold the place for \$10,000, July 31, he concluded that he would take the son with him, give him a trip to Europe, and let him mix in elite society—in consonance with those of the millionaire class. The complaint says that the father thought the son's wife was not sufficiently polished to hobnob with aristocrats, as her hands were rough from toil on the farm. Rough hands mattered little to Mrs. Shepard Jr., for she was born in Eastern Oregon, daughter of a stockman, and she can ride a bucking broncho and lariat a steer with any old vaquero who ever wore "shaps." Mrs. Shepard says she and Fred got along happily while on the 80-acre ranch, along the slope that leads to Bald Peak, and that she always went out and helped him in the fields—glad always to be with him, and he pleased to have her along—until the visit by the aristocratic parents. They conceived a dislike for her, and had the husband of the Oregon girl give her \$200 and ask her to get a divorce. Mrs. Shepard Jr. was not accustomed to such treatment, and she employed Portland attorneys to insist on her rights. Mrs. Shepard Jr. has not roped steers all her life for nothing, and she is just as game when it comes to protecting her marital rights.

Georgia Young Shepard was a woman liked by all. She was pleasant, hopeful, cheerful, and always a willing helper to the husband, and she had inherited enough executive ability from her stockman father to make a small farm and its management look like child's play.

Mrs. Shepard attended Pacific University when she was a girl, and County Clerk Bailey says that she was determined in her studies, and cared little for snubs from the elite.

The Argus hopes she will get a just compensation for her slight.

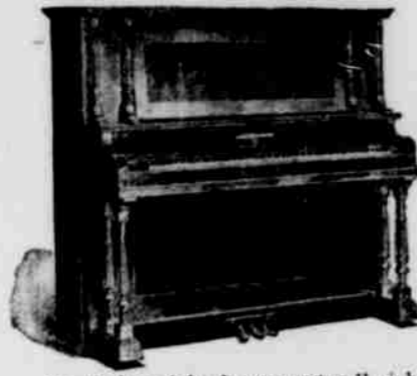
