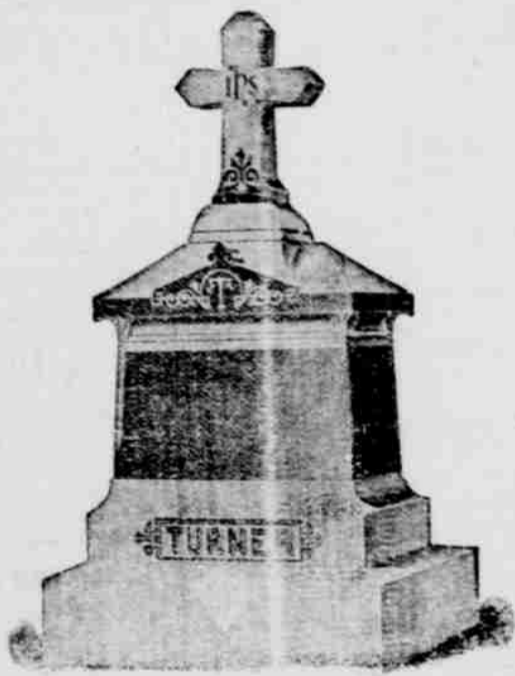

#### MRS. L. JEAN

Mrs. Nancy Cheatwood Jean, wife of Rev. L. Jean, died at the home, on Third Street, Thursday, Aug. 24, 1911, after six years of invalidism. She was born in North Carolina, April 1, 1830, and was wedded to Mr. Jean April 28, 1853, in Owen County, Indiana. Mr. and Mrs. Jean came to Portland in 1890, living there two years, and then in Seattle five years. Five years ago they returned to Oregon, and two years ago they settled in Hillsboro. Six years back Mrs. Jean had a fall, and sustained a fracture of the hip, from which she never recovered.

She had been the constant companion of her husband, who has been in the ministry over 50 years, and she became a member of the M. E. Church in 1852.

The husband and four children survive: Mrs. J. W. Taylor and Mrs. Laura J. Bryan, Seattle; Chas. W. Jean, of New York, and J. M. Jean, of Eastern Washington. Of her immediate family three brothers reside in Kansas, one in Indiana, and one sister, in Missouri.

In all the years of her invalidism Mrs. Jean never complained, but bore her suffering with fortitude. As she was about to pass away she called her husband to the bedside and said, with a smile, "I am going to leave you."

The funeral took place Sunday from the M. E. Church, Dr. T. B. Ford officiating, assisted by Rev. Blackwell.

#### WANTS WILL FILED

Dr. W. D. Wood has filed a petition in probate, through Attorneys Bagley & Hare, asking that the will of the late Mrs. Jane E. Wood, wife of C. W. Wood, be brought into court and filed in probate. The petition sets forth that the property consists of personal effects in the sum of \$10,000, and a house and lot, valued at \$1,500.
