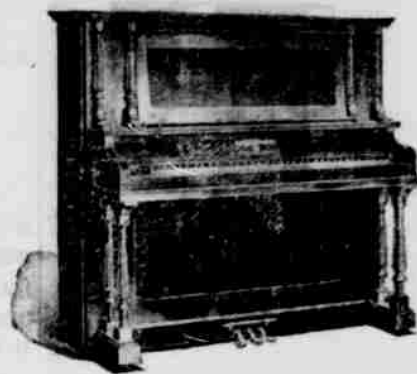
Next year will be the great one for rock crushers in Washington County. Granges are endorsing the contemplated road work, and opposition so far has been very small.
