S. P. FRANCHISE IS STILL IN STATU QUO

Council Takes no Action at Tues-
day Night's Session

TOWN IS BADLY DIVIDED OVER IT

Majority of Main Street Property Own-
ers are Willing

The city council took no action
on the Southern Pacific request
for a passenger franchise down
Main Street, at Tuesday eve-
ning's meeting, and the report
of the committee was held, and
the three councilmen, Boscow,
Smith and Kuratli, were instruct-
ed to hold a conference with the
officials of the road to ascertain
their best terms. The council
will again meet next Tuesday,
when the matter will again come
up for consideration. The report
filed asked for an annuity, cash,
from the company, in the sum of
\$1,500, and several other condi-
tions that Mr. Campbell had said
his company could not grant.
There was a big crowd in at-
tendance, some in favor of Main,
others in favor of Lincoln, and
others in favor of Paselene. At
the Saturday night meeting a
vote of these present favored the
Main Street grant, but no vote
was taken Tuesday evening.

The city treasurer was notified
that as interest collection on the
sewer and paving bonds would
be due Jan. 25, notice to prop-
erty owners should be given. It
was voted to hold in abeyance
\$1,600 of the rebate on the work
to await the action of the U. S.
Supreme Court as to the claim of
Cameron Bros., who claim a
royalty on the septic tank sys-
tem. Hartrampf, Heim and Ku-
ratli were appointed to appraise
the damages on the Benton Bow-
man tract in South Hillsboro, by
reason of the sewer line.

To revert back to the discus-
sion of the franchise, Mayor Bag-
ley took the floor in favor of the
grant, and in this he was sup-
ported by W. F. Magill, W. H.
Wehrung, W. N. Barrett, and C.
E. Kindt, who spoke for his sec-
tion of the county. Dr. F. A.
Bailey advised caution in the
terms of the franchise, and W.
G. Hare thought Lincoln would
be a good street for the line. Dr.
Wood thought that if the com-
pany would not take the fran-
chise as reported, that they
should go to a warmer place.
Councilman Smith explained his
position at length, said he was in
favor of Main, but wanted cer-
tain concessions. He also stated
that he was disappointed in not
having a conference with the S.
P. officials. They will meet with
them, this week, some time.

NOTICE OF BOND SALE

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids
will be received by the Recorder of the
City of Hillsboro, Oregon, up to the hour
of 10 a. m. of January 15, 1913, for the
purchase of "Hillsboro Water and Light
Refunding Bonds" aggregating the sum
of \$20,000, said bonds being numbered
from 1 to 18, inclusive, and each of said
bonds being of the denomination of \$1,000.
All of said bonds are dated September
1, 1911, and bear interest from date at
the rate of 5 per cent. per annum, payable
semi-annually, on March 1, and Septem-
ber 1, of each year.
All of said bonds mature on September
1, 1921, the city reserving the right to re-
deem any or all of said bonds at any
semi-annual coupon period, at or after
five years from the date thereof, upon
the payment of the face value thereof,
with accrued interest.
Said bonds shall not be sold for less
than par value, with accrued interest.
Each bid must be accompanied with a
cashier's draft for 5 per cent. of the
amount of said bid, payable to the order
of the Mayor of said City, and to be for-
feited to said City unless said bidder accepts
said bonds and pays therefor the amount
bid within ten days from the time said
bid is accepted.
