POULTRY RAISERS MUST VISIT DEMONSTRATION

O. A. C. and Southern Pacific Poultry Train Coming

CHANCE TO GET SOME POINTERS

Stops at Several Washington County Points—Here May 1

The following special from Corvallis should be of interest to the poultry growers of Washington County:

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., April 6—Today the poultry demonstration car, equipped by the Oregon Agricultural College and carried over the Southern Pacific lines through the state, starts on a 30-day journey which will be marked by 55 different stops at towns and cities enroute, for demonstrations and lectures to the school children and the general public.

The itinerary is as follows: Corvallis and Albany, April 6; Grants Pass, 7; Medford, 8; Central Point and Ashland, 9; Merlin and Gold Hill, 10; Glendale and Riddle, 11; Myrtle Creek and Roseburg, 12; Wilbur and Sutherlin, 13; Oakland, 14; Yoncalla and Cottage Grove, 15; Drain and Creswell, 16; Eugene, 16 and 17; Springfield, 17; Coburg and Eugene again, 18; Junction City, 18; Harrisburg and Halsey, 19; Albany and Lebanon, 20-21; Jefferson and West Scio, 23; Salem and Woodburn, 24; Gervais and back to Woodburn, 25; Silverton, 25; Mt. Angel, 25-6; Aurora and Canby, 26; Oregon City, 27-8; Sherwood, 28-9; Newberg and St. Joseph, 29; Carlton and McMinnville, 30; Gaston, 30; Beaverton and Hillsboro, May 1; Forest Grove, May 1-2; McCoy and LaFayette, 2; Sheridan, 3; Dallas and Independence, 4; Corvallis, 5.

First there will be a lecture and a demonstration especially for the school children, which will last from 10 to 11 o'clock and an hour. Following that there will be a half-hour lecture for the general public on "Poultry Feeding," and afterward for an hour or an hour and a half those interested will be given a demonstration and a chance to inspect the car exhibits. Another half-hour lecture for the general public on "Housing Chickens," and a demonstration and exhibit of an hour or more will close the program. There will be opportunity for everyone to ask questions regarding the solution of problems of their own particular location, so that the greatest possible amount of practical help may be given to all.
