 Clackamas County today filed its
 report, with the following state-
 ment, referring to the case:

 carefully and cautiously. We deprecate
 the attacks made upon him as unjust,
 unwarranted and uncalled for, and not
 in accordance with the facts."

 mies, or otherwise.
